
What is TMSV?

Tackling Modern Slavery in Viet Nam (TMSV) is an interagency programme working with Vietnamese Government and local actors to realise their potential to **reduce individual and community vulnerabilities to modern slavery** including **human trafficking** through

- Behaviour change communication
- Strengthened access to justice
- Victim-centered rehabilitation and reintegration support


<i>Beneficiaries</i>	Vulnerable Vietnamese populations, returned victims, vulnerable migrants, Government, and civil society actors

The challenge

3336 3336 Vietnamese migrants were referred to the UK National Referral Mechanism, 20% identified as victims of modern slavery from 2009 to 2019



In the UK, Vietnamese ranked as the 3rd highest nationality of potential victims of modern slavery with 887 referrals in 2019 (Source: UK Home Office)

WHAT IS MODERN SLAVERY?


Modern slavery is the umbrella term, often used to describe various forms of exploitative and abusive practices. It includes a set of specific legal concepts, such as **forced labour, debt bondage, forced marriage, slavery and slavery-like practices, and human trafficking.**

Among the 887 referrals


The majority of the referrals came from Northern and Northern Central Coastal provinces of Viet Nam



55% experienced labor exploitation




Adult Vietnamese men, including male minors representing over **71%** of all cases

Together with consortium partners, Vietnamese Government partners and local community actors, the project aims to change behaviours and promote alternative livelihood opportunities, strengthen access to the local justice system and victim services to maximise the impact of collective action in reducing vulnerabilities to modern slavery.
